Members are reminded that "AAUW national dues are \$49.00, of which \$46.00 is tax deductible by the individual member; \$3.00 of that national dues payment is not tax deductible because it will be used to support the AAUW Action Fund's Section 501(c)(4) activities (Lobby Corps and election-related activities)." (from the AAUW website). From now until March 15th, members may pay half-year AAUW dues of \$24.50. Add in the \$10 state dues and whatever your branch has declared local dues, and it is a great bargain! This deal is only available for NEW MEMBERS. And if you pair that with an advertised program, have people sign the Shape the Future attendance form and join on the spot, AAUW dues are only \$12.25 plus full state and local dues.

"A new member is someone entirely new to AAUW or lapsed for two years or more. National members (formerly MALs) are not new members to AAUW but 'transfers' when they join a branch. E-mail <u>connect@aauw.org</u> or call 800/326-2289 to verify the status of any former/national member." (from the AAUW website.) After March 15th, new members go back to paying full AAUW dues of \$49 plus state and local dues, but their membership runs until the following June. It is almost getting three extra months free! All returning members are reminded to pay their dues before they leave for the summer.

Feminist pedagogy panel enlightens MSU

A feminist pedagogy panel was held in the John Grisham building on the third floor of the library

Thursday. The panel consisted of open discussion with Ashley Baker, Kay Brocato and Emily Ryalls. The panel brought awareness to some of the staff members at Mississippi State University, and it was a wonderful way for people to voice their different opinions and gain a better understanding of the term "feminism." Ashley Baker, Introduction to Gender Studies professor, was one of three speakers at the panel. Each faculty member enjoyed hearing what she had to say regarding feminism and the way she catches the attention of her students.

"I think the panel went great," she said. "There was a nice turnout, and both the panel and the audience had wonderful ideas on being great educators." Baker said her personal definition of feminism means to recognize the power in our society and fighting for equality for both men and women, and she considers herself to be a feminist.

Emily Ryalls, dual gender studies and communication professor, was the mastermind behind the panel. She said she very much enjoyed speaking with the public and hearing what everyone has to say about modern society and the way people view feminism. "I enjoy being in a room full of smart people and hearing what they have to say and how they teach their students, and yes, I do consider myself a feminist," she said. According to both Baker and Ryalls, feminist pedagogy enables students to see how larger social problems relate to their everyday life. Kay Brocato, who teaches a course titled, 'Planning for the Diversity of Learners, said she was honored to speak with both Ryalls and Baker during the panel. "By attending this discussion, I gained a real validation that so many people across this campus are interested in challenging injustice and challenging things that can be oppressive without even realizing," she said. Brocato said she never considered herself a feminist until she came in contact with Baker. Baker made her realize she was a feminist who enjoyed bringing equality to all people. As a mother of two, Brocato says she does not take the term lightly.

Tech Savvy

The AAUW Cleveland MS Branch will host its second Annual Tech Savvy Conference at Delta State University on March 21, 2015 under the sponsorship of AAUW-Mississippi. The Tech Savvy conference implements recommendations from AAUW's 2010 research report Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.

The conference is designed to attract 6-9th grade girls to these fields by encouraging them to see themselves as future scientists, engineers, mathematicians, and computer scientists, allow local female teachers, professors, and professionals to lead hands-on workshops, help the girls learn about a variety of STEM professions, aid the girls in gaining "Savvy Skills" such as negotiation and public speaking, and allow the adults to attend a daylong simultaneous program to learn about how to support girls in STEM and plan for higher education.

The Conference will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and online registration at cleveland-ms.aauw.net will begin February 6, 2015 for 200 girls along with their parents. The registration fee is \$10 which includes a light breakfast, lunch and a t-shirt for the girls.

The AAUW Cleveland MS Branch partnered with the Gender Studies Group of Delta State University to host a Domestic Violence Awareness Panel Discussion on November 6, 2014 at the Hugh Walker Ellis Alumni House. Panelist were local experts in the field to speak on what is domestic violence, the warning signs, and the many resources that are available. Sheriff Kelvin Williams of Bolivar County, Executive Director Dr. Patricia Davenport of Our House, Inc., and Minister Joe McCall of New Life Church served on the panel.

Upcoming events include recognizing Equal Pay Day on April 14, 2015. We will collaborate with local restaurants in recognizing the symbolic day when women's earnings (78 cents to men's dollar) finally catch up to men's earnings for the previous year by offering a discount at the local restaurants on Equal Pay Day. We will use this day to patronize these restaurants for aiding AAUW in its awareness campaign and call of action.

IN MEMORIAM Dorothy Sample Shawhan CLEVELAND BRANCH



Dorothy Sample Shawhan, a beloved member for more than 30 years of the Cleveland Branch of the AAUW, died on December 21, after a brief illness. Dorothy committed herself to education and community service and was also a powerful and accomplished writer of both fiction and biography. Dorothy's contributions to the life and culture of Mississippi encompassed the personal and the institutional, community action and artistic achievement, all driven by a passion for the advancement of women.

As a teacher of English, journalism, and creative writing at Delta State since 1981, and as Chair of the Division of Languages and Literature (1992-2006), Dorothy transformed the lives of students and colleagues through her generous support and mentorship. A creative and stimulating teacher, Dorothy was honored with both DSU's Kossman Outstanding Teacher Award and the Mississippi Humanities Council's Teaching Award for Delta State. Dorothy broke new ground for education in the Delta: in the 1980s, with two colleagues, she invented and taught a course on women's writing; in subsequent years, the History Department asked her to develop a course on women's history.

One of Dorothy's talents was the ability to perceive a need and devise a remedy: she co-founded the literary magazine *Tapestry* (now in its twenty-seventh year) to celebrate the creative and scholarly work of DSU faculty.

Dorothy's influence was felt throughout the Delta and the state: she was dynamically involved (often in leadership positions) with the Mississippi Council of Teachers of English, the Bolivar County Habitat for Humanity, the United Way, the University Press of Mississippi, the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters, and the Friends of Dahomey National Wildlife Refuge. Dorothy served for many, many years as president of the Cleveland Branch of the AAUW, spearheading the effort to raise funds to provide scholarships for local women. In 1997 she received the AAUW Woman of Achievement Award-only a small recognition of her importance to the community.

A sensitive and prolific writer committed to hearing and imagining women's voices, particularly voices native to the Mississippi Delta, Dorothy wrote many personal essays, articles on pedagogy and women's history, book reviews, and, of course, fiction. Her novel *Lizzie*, for which she received the 1996 Fiction Writer of the Year Award from the Mississippi Library Association, focuses with passion and sympathy on the coming of age of women in Mississippi, tracing their development against a range of regional—and national—social obstacles: of education, sexuality, profession, and voice. Her work exhibits a humanity marked by a quiet thoughtfulness and introspection, enlivened by a playful sense of individual and social idiosyncrasy. Indeed, this eye for the particular was one of her greatest strengths of her writing—a clear-eyed recognition that the eccentric, even comic, peculiarities of life could acquire power and dignity as they unsettle comfortable ways of looking at the world. In her writing Dorothy celebrated and critiqued the uneasy harmonic relationships between individual and community voices, between past and present, between fiction and history.

As engaging and powerful as her fiction is, Dorothy's non-fiction writing may have the most lasting impact in defining and preserving the memory of some of Mississippi's significant women. Lucy Somerville Howorth: New Deal Lawyer, Politician, and Feminist from the South (LSU Press, 2006), written with historian Martha Swain, chronicles one of Mississippi's most independent and most socially active women, defining her impact in local, state, and national terms. Spirit of the Delta: The Art of Carolyn Norris (University Press of Mississippi, 2011) makes available the work and vision of a self-taught local artist well beyond the region. At her death, Dorothy was revising her biography (for UPM) of Fannye A. Cook, conservationist and founder of the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries and Parks and the Mississippi Natural Science Museum. Dorothy's work makes it possible for us now-and will for generations of others-to understand and appreciate what other outstanding women have done.

Dorothy is remembered for her warmth, her wit, the genuine delight she took in other people. She was not only an artist and storyteller; she was an audience-a reader of other people's writing and an assiduous presence at lectures, readings, plays, art exhibitions, recitals and concerts. She had the gifts of interest and empathy and also the gift of laughter. What was most remarkable about Dorothy Shawhan is evident in the energy and grace of her writing, in the learning she pursued, and in the relationships she developed throughout her life. She heard other people with a generous attentiveness, interested herself in their discoveries, and quietly shared her own. She listened to the voices around her and tried to bridge gaps in understanding. We miss her.

Statement of Award

The AAUW, Mississippi will award annually a **Woman of Achievement Award**. Any woman residing in Mississippi will be eligible to receive the award. Membership in AAUW is not required.

The state committee is composed of the *Woman of Achievement Chair, Program Vice President, Diversity Chair, Equity Chair, and Public Relations Chair.* In the event of a vacancy in these areas, the president will appoint a replacement.

An appropriately engraved plaque for the state award will be presented at spring convention. Branches are encouraged to make local awards during National Women's History Week.

Selection Process

(1) The state committee shall serve as the selection committee.

(2) Only AAUW branch members shall submit nominations on a form published in the state bulletin or secured from branch presidents or the WOA Chair.

(3) Any woman residing in Mississippi is eligible. Nominations need not be limited to AAUW members.

(4) Criteria should include:

(a) Her commitment to women's equity

(b) Her commitment to education

(c) Her contributions to society

(d) Her contributions to AAUW priorities (e) The appearance, quality, and

specificity of the nomination (5) Upon receiving nominations, selection committee members will tabulate the criteria and send the tabulation sheet to the WOA chair. The woman receiving the most votes shall be declared "Woman of Achievement".

(6) The name of the recipient will not be announced until the presentation at the state convention.

(7) The award shall be a plaque,

appropriately engraved.
